





LdB supports Reynolds watershed efforts

The RM of Lac du Bonnet has expressed support to expand the Northeast Red Watershed District (NRWD) to include an area of Reynolds that is not currently covered.

Council recently passed a resolution to that effect during a regular meeting on Oct. 22 following a 25-plus minute deliberation.

Watershed districts are a partnership between municipalities and the province that collaborate through local boards to protect, restore and manage land and water resources through locally delivered programs.

In 2022, the RM of Lac du Bonnet became a member of the NRWD, which provides for a comprehensive, coordinated approach allowing municipalities and communities to appoint board members, who would be responsible to develop programming, budgets and approve a watershed management plan.

As a portion of Reynolds' agricultural area is not covered by the existing watershed, that the municipality sought to create a new district—the Winnipeg River Watershed District. While Lac du Bonnet council is supportive of ensuring Reynolds receives the coverage it seeks, there was a consensus that expanding the NRWD would be a more suitable approach.

Lac du Bonnet Deputy Reeve Greg Mandzuk, who is also the appointed member on the NRWD-Catfish Creek subdistrict, said the request to join the proposed Winnipeg River Watershed was to get the province further investigating and ultimately putting together a plan that would bring in agriculture areas in Reynolds that are not currently included.

"That's what the original intent

was for, it wasn't to create and have us to join the Winnipeg River Watershed, it was just to create a watershed in principle so that the province would come in and plan," Mandzuk said. "And then we wouldn't have to join at the end of the day, but the plan would be there."

Coun. Cindy Kellendonk suggested the Association of Manitoba Municipalities could perhaps provide an additional voice to advocate the province "make it more equitable for all of the participants on any watershed."

But Mandzuk said that avenue would take longer and that "in the meantime, they want to get this through to the province so that the province will start planning for this new watershed."

Reeve Loren Schinkel said the broader discussion should also include consideration as to "what value are we getting out of the watershed district."

The reeve added the only opportunity would be gaining access to the province's Growing Outcomes in Watersheds (GROW) program that supports conservation projects on agricultural lands, and wondered how many Lac du Bonnet ag producers are actually using that.

"That's part of the reason that Reynolds wants this, because they feel that their ag community is totally left out," he said. "It seems like the province really didn't do their homework, from our opinion, because that should have been done before this whole area for the northeast was created."

Schinkel also said there is the matter of drainage with water flows from Reynolds coming through the area as well as an ongoing moratorium on Maple Creek that should be part of a broader discussion. Additionally, the reeve suggested sending ag

producers surveys to determine whether they have access to the GROW program and from there make a more informed decision.

Reynolds Reeve Russ Gawluk told *The Clipper* he appreciates Lac du Bonnet supporting the NRWD's expansion, which is what Reynolds requested.

"But we were advised (by the province) that was not going to be an option, and would we consider the province creating this new watershed instead," he said. "We didn't know that the province would even consider a new watershed. It hadn't entered the conversation at all when we first started this initiative."

Gawluk also said his council intends to further educate land-owners. Jan. 18 has been tentatively set for a town hall attended by provincial representatives and other watershed managers to share some insight and field questions about what creating the watershed would mean.

"If the landowners understand what's in it for them, it'll give the council a better idea of whether we can opt in there and expect this extra levy that we would have to pay," he said.

He said some practices science has determined are detrimental for the environment, such as dragging the wheels of fertilizer units in rivers or cattle trampling through drinking water sources.

"There is tremendous sponsorship from the provincial government as well as other areas sponsoring these programs so our landowners and farm community don't have to pay it all out of their own pocket for this environmental protection," he said. "I believe that Manitoba is very advanced with the watershed programs, and I just look forward to the whole province being involved in it and our landowners having the oppor-

tunity to correct some of the things that we could have done better in the past and have opportunity to do better in the future.

When contacted for additional clarification, Schinkel expressed full support for whichever option Reynolds deems best for producers.

"Whatever the RM of Reynolds thinks is best for them,

that's what we're trying to support here," Schinkel said, adding a major factor to consider is that some municipalities situated within the proposed watershed would straddle two districts.

"From an economic standpoint, that's the only thing. But I mean, that's ultimately their decision, and we'll support whatever way they want to go on that."

Municipalities stretching budget dollars

Re-use, recycle, rethink how to get work done without breaking the bank

As costs rise more than budgets, municipalities and towns across North Eastman are working hard to stretch those finances as much as possible.

Over the summer, the RM of Springfield approved purchasing an asphalt hotbox trailer for a maximum of \$155,000. Public Works Director Blaine Moffat said it will help the municipality in many ways. The units maintain asphalt's temperature, which allows it to be used for longer periods. That reduces waste and allows leftover material to be reused.

"It allows us to be seasonal; we don't have to wait for asphalt plants to open in the spring or for contractors to be available. It certainly reduces our expenses over-Public Works manager Mike Wels said municiplained. "This, in turn, reduces wear and tear on machinery, extending its lifespan and lowering longterm maintenance costs.' On July 5, municipal officials across the province gathered in Beausejour to watch Alberta-based Magnum Services demonstrate its cement soil stabilization process on Atlantic Avenue. Used for decades in Europe and successfully in Alberta, it is new in Manitoba. The process involves

pulverizing the existing road with a specialized machine. The materials are ground and blended into a homogenous mix and replaced. A cement powder mix is spread onto the surface, after which the machine connects to a water truck and passes over the mixture to blend the material and hydrate the cement via computer controls.

Town of Beausejour Mayor Ray Schirle learned about the process at a conference and arranged to have Magnum Services do a demonstration in Beausejour for regional officials. Because the company had the opportunity to showcase its method to multiple potential customers, Beausejour paid \$118,500 for 4,500 square metres of Atlantic Avenue. They were quoted \$1.2 million to repair that section a few years earlier.

Magnum's efforts paid off, as they lined up at least one additional customer.

"The RM of Lac du Bonnet is planning to use the

new remediation method next year," Reeve Loren Schinkel said, noting the region has a follow-up presentation from the company in the near future.

Schinkel said roads and infrastructure are one key area where the RM of Lac du Bonnet looks for cost savings.

'We do screen our own gravel in our leased pit for use on agriculture roads," Schinkel said. "We are always looking to reduce costs while improving services. Obviously, like other communities and municipalities, we struggle with the infrastructure needs and deficit."

cess to the Association of front expenses? Manitoba Municipalities' Group Buying Program. Part of Canoe Procurement of Canada, the cooperative

purchasing program provides municipalities with preferred membership pricing, dividends, consolidated invoicing and access to vendors selling office supplies, vehicles, tires, and heavy

equipment.

Brokenhead Reeve Brad Saluk said the program allows rural municipalities so get volume discounts. However, he acknowledged it doesn't always match the needs of municipalities at the time. If the equipment is specialized, there may be no vendor in the program. RMs also want to support local businesses.

Saluk cautioned that some initiatives do save money, but only after significant up-front costs. As material costs rise faster than budgets do, can a municipality justify added up-

In Brokenhead's case, Saluk questions why the price of many items has risen as high as it has. Municipalities are still paying pandemic prices of 25 to 40 per cent more than before. A grader that used to cost \$350,000 may now run \$600,000.

The machines aren't necessarily 25 to 40 per cent better. Saluk cited a recent fire truck purchase with a standard cab and chassis. What used to cost \$80,000 now approaches \$200,000.

"The simple fact of why it costs so much is because it can," Saluk lamented. "It's a specialized service and you're stuck."

Like all municipal residents, Saluk would love to see more done. But he's also

I wish to thank our Legions, community centres and schools in the Lac du Bonnet constituency who host Remembrance Day services. Thank you as well to the cadets and volunteers who distribute

poppies and help with these events so that we all may commemorate those who fought to defend our

With the Legislative Assembly taking a break from session for constituency week Oct. 21-25, I welcomed the opportunity to visit some of our communities within the Lac du Bonnet constituency and was able to participate in the North Eastman Municipal Forum on Oct. 21 in Whitemouth. Healthcare and economic growth were key topics as they are important to our region. Our municipalities are looking at initiatives they can take to help improve access to medical care inside our rural communities and provide resources to assist with local planning and development projects. I

will continue to support their efforts by advocating to the NDP government for improvements to these and other essential services needed within the Lac du Bonnet constituency.

In a news conference following the March 2024 re-announcement of the Lac du Bonnet personal care home Premier Kinew was quoted, "we're here to say there will be shovels in the ground this year." Since then, there has been little to no communication with local officials and zero action on the construction of the project. During Question Period in the legislature, I continue to ask the premier questions regarding the status of the Lac du Bonnet PCH, including the cost and when he plans on sharing information with the community. I also

reminded him that the ground will soon be frozen so he will need more than

Before the break, the premier responded on the record that the Lac du Bonnet personal care home is going to cost \$66.4 million and he will be happy to schedule a meeting with the community to provide an update. Plus, while sharing his expertise on how to dig a hole in the winter time, he promised that even if he has to go on his birthday, the last day of the year, with his own shovel, they will break ground on this project this year. While that would certainly make for another popular photoop for the premier, the fact of the matter is the continued delay on the construction of Lac du Bonnet personal care home comes at a much greater cost to those who are waiting for a bed, and their families.

Back in the Legislature on Oct. 29, the NDP used their majority numbers to push through a \$24 billion omnibus budget bill that gives them the freedom and power to raise taxes without any public input or accountability, leaving Manitobans to foot the bill.

During debate, the PCs outlined major concerns with the 2024 budget which includes; fuel and property tax hikes, income tax hikes for skilled

workers, higher energy bills, restrictive labour laws and partisan use of public funds. The budget also fails to allocate any funding for new schools, daycares or personal care homes, and slashes tens of millions in funding for community development and youth employment programs. As the Official Opposition, we proposed amendments in order to protect Manitoba families and small businesses from future surprise NDP tax increases, but instead the NDP chose partisanship over affordability to advance their political agenda without any accountability.

By pushing this omnibus budget bill through the legislature, with no opportunity for public hearings on notable changes to our province's labour and election financing laws, the Kinew NDP are forcing Manitobans to pay for an expensive budget they had absolutely no say in.

As the Official Opposition, the PCs will continue to hold the NDP government to account and advocate for the rights of all Manitobans to have their say on important legislation that affects them and their families.



Tyndall man killed in multi-vehicle collision

A Tyndall man was killed in a multiple-vehicle collision on a Floodway bridge north of Winnipeg last week.

On Nov. 6 at approximately 6:30 a.m., Selkirk RCMP responded to a multi-vehicle collision on Hwy 59, that occurred on the bridge just south of Springhill Winter Sports Park.

The initial investigation determined that a southbound vehicle lost control on the bridge. This resulted in a chain reaction of collisions that involved 19 vehicles. It is believed icy road conditions were a factor in the collision.

When officers arrived on scene, they immediately began re-routing vehicles to avoid further collisions at the site.

Officers from Red River North RCMP detachment, along with other emergency responders including nearby fire departments and ambulances were all on scene to assist motorists with a variety of minor injuries. Traffic was re-routed for several hours as vehicles were removed.

A 55-year-old male from the LUD of Tyndall-Garson was pronounced deceased on scene.

Check your credit reports, bank and credit card statements and report any irregularities.


Shred personal and financial documents before putting them in the garbage.



CNL firefighters second at nationals

A team of Canadian Nuclear Laboratories (CNL) firefighters from the Whiteshell Laboratories Fire Department made their mark recently at the National FireFit Championships recently held in Kamloops, BC.

In addition to bringing home a silver medal in the Industrial Relay, CNL teammates Mitch Kubas, Evan Michaels, Brett Brydges, Kyle Friesen and Brad Russel would go on to achieve a Top 10 national overall finish in an event that included over 135 elite competitors from across Canada, the U.S. and Europe.

Their success at the National Championships followed a strong showing at the Prairie Regional Fire Championships in Humboldt, SK in August, an event that gathered the most talented firefighters from across Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Nunavut. In what also proved to be a fierce competition, the Whiteshell Fire Department team took home a bronze medal in the Team Relay, while Kubas as team captain showcased his individual firefighting skill by finishing in the Top 12 of the entire competition with a personal best time.

"I couldn't be prouder of the Whiteshell Fire team for throwing themselves into this competition, demonstrating grit, teamwork and determination, and achieving outstanding results against the very best firefighters in Canada and internationally," commented Brent MacDonald, the Fire Chief at the Whiteshell Laboratories

campus. "This past year has not been without its challenges, which make these achievements all the more impressive."

The team's performance in the FireFit Championships was particularly impressive since each member was able to shave off between eight and 17 seconds from their previous individual records, together setting a team best run of 1:18:42 in the Industrial Relay. Individually, Kubas also finished with a personal best time of 1:26:99, making him the second fastest firefighter from Manitoba ever recorded, and placing him in the Top 30 nationally. The team intends to continue competing in future FireFit competitions, hoping to build on their performance and everything that they learned at the national championships.

First held in 1994, the FireFit Championships challenges first responders with a variety of demanding and exciting tasks commonly performed in emergency situations. The spirit of FireFit is to showcase the demands of firefighting, with competitors dressed as they would at the scene of a fire. FireFit Challenges include hose hoists, forcible entry, victim rescues and more challenges that are completed within the FireFit Canada rule parameters, time limits and participation guidelines. According to MacDonald, these events are incredibly important for firefighters to maintain the necessary skills and capabilities in what is a difficult and challenging

career. It can come down to fractions of a second in competition and real life.

"Our entry into FireFit was actually self-initiated by our firefighters at Whiteshell, who held their own internal competition to choose our best competitors, giving everyone the opportunity to compete. They recognize that FireFit competitions are not just about medals – they are crucial for maintaining our firefighters' physical and mental fitness," MacDonald said. "Firefighters face unpredictable and dangerous situations on a daily basis, and being in peak condition is vital for their safety and effectiveness on the job. Events like the FireFit Championships motivate our team, pushing them to train harder, improve their skills, and build camaraderie."

Province invests in mineral development

The Manitoba government is announcing an additional intake of up to \$2 million in funding through the Manitoba Mineral Development Fund (MMDF) to spur immediate economic growth.

"Our government is growing the critical mineral sector and creating good jobs for Manitobans by enabling the Manitoba Mineral Development Fund to advance projects in Manitoba," Economic Development, Investment, Trade and Natural Resources Minister Jamie Moses said Nov. 4.

Administered through the Manitoba Chamber of Commerce, the MMDF strategically funds economic development and mining projects of up to \$300,000 per project that create Indigenous partnerships, increase local employment and stimulate investment. Since 2020, \$14.7 million has been provided to 90 projects. This has leveraged over \$128 million in private sector capital, generated over 660 jobs and 128 community and Indigenous partnerships.

"The MMDF has been an overwhelming success in providing funding that has resulted in increased opportunities for partnerships and development along with employment opportunities that have strengthened and greatly benefited communities in the north and across the province," said Chuck Davidson, president and CEO, Manitoba Chambers of Commerce, and chair

of the MMDF board. "The Manitoba government's ongoing commitment to supporting and investing in projects that contribute to sustainable mineral development will help position Manitoba as a leader in the mineral sector."

The Manitoba government has also partnered with the Mining Association of Manitoba Inc. to revise and modernize the guidelines for early mineral exploration. The guidelines provide clear direction to industry for undertaking early mineral exploration in the province to support and educate companies as they plan early mineral exploration projects to the highest standards.

The federal government has identified 34 minerals as critical for promoting green energy and sustainable economic success Manitoba, which is sixth on the Fraser Institute Annual Survey of Mining Companies; Investment Global Attractiveness Index, has 30 of these 34 critical minerals. Critical minerals are crucial for Manitoba's growth as a low-carbon leader and are essential to developing clean technologies, energy storage systems, electric vehicles and other technologies that advance net-zero targets.





Consumers Focus

While we can't see our digital buildup like we can see the junk we've amassed in the attic, it can cause user problems ranging from unnecessary expenses to compromised digital security. One company has introduced a service that evens the playing field for what can be a lopsided battle.

Yorba recently debuted its subscription-tracking service in Canada. A free service lets users track and organize paid subscriptions and emails. A paid one, which costs \$6 per month, connects to bank accounts so unwanted expenses can be cancelled. Alerts notify users before subscriptions are due so they can be cancelled without incurring charges.

A recent survey found that 73 per cent of Canadians admit to subscribing to a service for a free or cheaper trial period then forgetting to cancel. Two-thirds of us admit to paying for subscriptions we forgot about.

While the average Canadian thinks they have four monthly subscriptions, they have eight. They think they spend \$86 per month on subscription services when

the actual sum is \$219. What could you do with an extra \$133 per month?

Companies count on us to forget these little charges that add up. If we remember them, they make it hard to cancel through a series of "dark patterns" that make us give up because cancelling is too complicated.

They can also make the process hard to find online. Many services offer easy online registration but force us to call somewhere when we want to cancel. Others let us cancel before the renewal date but don't tell us when that is.

Yorba CEO Chris Ze-

unstrom said there are additional reasons for de-cluttering our online presence. Fewer online accounts reduce our vulnerability to data breaches. Zeunstrom used the analogy that the oldest doors are the easiest to break down. By deleting old and unused accounts, we give criminals less access to passwords and personal data.

Zeunstrom started Yorba after struggling to manage recurring spending at a previous company. That was two years ago, and Yorba's popularity has taken off. There are many reasons, beginning with financial ones.

However, there is also a growing trend of digital minimalism, where people wish to reduce their online presence. Many recognize their vulnerability to data breaches. Others hear of recent privacy policy shifts where companies use our online spending and activity patterns to train their artificial intelligence models.

"People are really overwhelmed with everything out there, everything that you sign up for," Zeunstrom said. "You have to create accounts everywhere. All these dark patterns online keep more and more stuff just coming at you. Yorba helps you fight back."

Credit companies for being resourceful. Give your email address for a contest, and it might get stored in a holding company's database. That holding company is related to 10 companies, so now you're on 10 lists. One of those companies might have seven different newsletters with your address in each one. Another company sells it to 10 more who repeat the process over and over.

Unsubscribing to one of them doesn't delete you from all of them. You have to unsubscribe individually.

"If you read the fine print, they can basically do whatever they want with it," Zeunstrom said.

Some folks pay for things twice. Zeunstrom sees this with television streaming and bundling. Viewers subscribe to a bundle of channels for one or two and forget the rest. They later add a channel, not knowing it is part of a bundle they previously signed up for. Don't rely on the provider's benevolence.

"All this data is out there; the banks have it over here, the email providers have it there," Zeunstrom said. "Yorba's value proposition is if you're on a list at an organization, we aggregate that to show you all the lists, all the things that you're on out there to help you start to remove those."

Removing the spam lets users focus on more important tasks. Zeunstrom says users are increasingly motivated by the fear of losing important messages in the sea of junk they'resent.

When signing up to Yorba, the user connects their email account. Yorba scans for all the logins, along with data breaches that email address is linked to. It also identifies the mailing lists.

The subscription scanning service connects to a user's bank account through a company called Plaid. They don't use your data, but they run a script that looks for keywords and recurring transactions ranging from Netflix to mortgages.

Fewer emails, more online security, and a few extra bucks in the bank. Zeunstrom said the benefits are many. There's a downside to ignoring it.

"It's like an engine," he concluded. "The gunk builds up until the car becomes unusable."

David Francey show delights EMCA

Long-awaited and highly anticipated, David Francey took the stage to a full house of enthusiastic Eastern Manitoba Concert Association fans for an evening of stories and song Nov. 8 in Pinawa.

With themes that alternated between love and loss, the four-time Juno Award winner welcomed the audience into his world, sharing how his life experiences, often recounted in humorous ways, inspired his music.

Francey, whose career as a folk musician has only slightly outlasted his time as a construction worker, is a keen observer and (self-admitted) hopeless romantic. Songs like the plaintive *Lonely Road* and the gritty *Cheap Motel* painted vivid scenes of life as a travelling musician. Meanwhile, *Come Rain or Come Shine* and *I Called It Love* were playful love songs, dedicated to his wife Beth and his many elementary school crushes, respectively.

Francey didn't shy away from serious topics either, singing about the tragic loss of a fishing boat (in *Just Before Christmas*), John Prine's passing (in *This Morning*), and the politically charged *Time for the Wicked to Rest*.

The evening was as much about storytelling as it was about music, and Francey's anecdotes had a whimsical, meandering quality, drawing the audience down unexpected paths. His stories about the songs often

lasted far longer than his typically brief, under-three-minute compositions.

Murphy, a well-known East Coast musician, is the latest in a line of masterful guitarists Francey has partnered with across his 13 album releases. With Balogh's smooth countermelodies, the two musicians created lush musical backdrops for Francey's songs. Their soaring harmonies shone, especially in the a cappella rendition of *Torn Screen Door*.

Francey's relaxed, hands-inpockets delivery was a joy to watch, and many audience members likely left with the feeling of having witnessed one of Canada's true folk greats.


