LDB Foundation distributes fall grants

It was a bountiful autumn for eight local organizations as the Lac du Bonnet and District (LDB) Charitable Foundation announced its fall grants on Nov. 5.

Founded in 2008, the LDB Foundation creates and manages funds and distributes its earnings twice a year to qualified charitable organizations. Dollar amounts for this year's fall granting season ranged from \$819 to \$5,000.

First up was a presentation made on-site at the Lac du Bonnet Community Gardens. A cheque for \$5,000 was presented to Leslie Wakeman, Pete Lovering and Elaine and Lionel Vincent. These funds will go toward the purchase of a 12' x 16' shed for

'A new shed will be a much-needed addition to our garden. The doubling of garden membership in 2024 meant that we had to increase tools and equipment. That made for a crowded shed," Wakeman said. "We will keep wagons, wheelbarrows and larger equipment separate from the general tools for the comfort and convenience of gardeners. This will be safer and allow gardeners ease of access to both sheds. Additional materials, like the children's garden education materials, will be housed in the shed as well. "

Next up was a presentation of \$1,000 to the Lac du Bonnet Ice Fishing Derby towards the purchase of volunteer identification vests. General manager Darlene Lamoureux accepted the cheque.

Directors Rick Waltham and Dennis Soloway of the Eastman SnoPals then received \$2,000 to assist with the purchase of a new snowmobile for trail maintenance work. This was followed by Diane Babiak and the Two Rivers Seniors Resource Council being awarded \$1,250 for a new upright energy-efficient freezer for their Let's Do Lunch program.

The Lee River Snow Riders also had a good day, receiving \$2,000 to help with the purchase of two professional-grade chainsaws for maintenance work Derrick Roy was on hand to receive those funds.

The Lac du Bonnet and Area Food

Bank received \$819 for garden fencing to prevent wildlife from damaging the plants in their garden. After accepting her cheque, garden coordinator Lillian Wall laughed when explaining that this year, a pesky resident bunny ate most of the lettuce and spinach.

Lac du Bonnet Community Centre presi-

dent Sharalyn Reitlo was very thankful to receive \$5,000 to help purchase a new 4' x 8' LED electronic messaging sign.

The final recipient on the day was the du Bonnet and District Historical Society, with a grant of \$2,000 towards the relocation of the St. Anthony Petchersky Ukrainian Catholic Church to a new location by the museum at Halliday Park.

Foundation board members remind everyone that the foundation is at the Lac du Bonnet Christmas Craft Sale at the community centre on Dec. 16, collecting donations during Endow Manitoba's Giving Challenge. Contributions were topped up during the giving period of Nov. 12-17.



Flu and COVID shots available: IERHA

Regional Health Authority (IERHA) is advising residents there is still time to get their flu and COVID shots this season as public health respiratory virus vaccine clinics are occurring until Nov. 30.

Seasonal influenza, pneumococcal 20 and COVID-19 vaccines are available for those eligible as per Manitoba Health guidelines. Immunization with the most updated COVID-19 vaccine is strongly recommended for previously vaccinated and unvaccinated individuals at increased risk of COV-

The Interlake-Eastern ID-19 infection or severe

Book an appointment by calling 1-844-626-8222 between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday to Friday or by using the online booking system found at www.ierha. ca "Programs and Services" and "Annual Immunization Clinics".

"Public health has immunized over 5,000 people against both COVID and flu this fall," said IERHA manager health services, public health east Wendy Fontaine. "Respiratory virus season is expected to last another three to four months, so there's still time for people

to protect themselves by getting the COVID and flu shots.

Respiratory virus shots are available for all ages with different doses administered according to age.

Parents with younger children are encouraged to check out www.ierha.

ca and click on "patient information", "where to go" and "kid care" for tips on taking care of children experiencing respiratory

illness and fever.

Immunizations are also available all season from community health offices, clinics and pharmacies.

Canada Post strike disruption

A Canada Post strike has disrupted mail delivery nationwide, including distribution of government and banking documents, parcels and The Clipper in some areas.

The Canadian Union of Postal Workers (CUPW) stopped delivering mail across the country as of Nov. 15 with 55,000 workers walking off the job over wages, working conditions and other issues. As a result, Canada Post isn't processing or delivering any mail and parcels as long as the strike lasts.

The stoppage will hit rural communities particularly hard as they rely solely on Canada Post for deliveries because many courier companies don't fully service rural areas. As Purolator is a subsidiary of Canada Post, Purolator staff will not handle mail that originated with Canada Post in an act of solidarity.

Canada Post and the union have agreed to continue delivering government benefit cheques including old ages security, the Canada Child Benefit and the Canada Pension Plan during the

labour disruption. Seniors and others who rely on the mail service will still receive financial assistance, but delays are anticipated.

MPI customers will not receive their annual statements for their driver's licence, vehicle registration and insurance until the stoppage is resolved.

Service Canada has urged Canadians to set up online accounts and direct deposits. Several Canadian banks have also advised customers to switch to online statements and e-banking to manage statements, bills and banking communication.

Several Towns and RMs across North Eastman are encouraging residents to register for access to tax and utility information, pre-authorized debits and sign up for email notifications to receive important updates. Payment can be made online or in person at administrative offices.

The Canada Post strike

will have no impact on distribution of *The Clipper* in Beausejour, Oakbank, Dugald, Lac du Bonnet, Pinawa, Pine Falls, Whitemouth and Reynolds.

Those who normally receive the community newspaper via Canada Post in the RM of Brokenhead can pick it up at the Clipper Publishing office located at 27 Third St. S in Beausejour, the Brokenhead muncipal office at the corner of Hwy 44 and PR 302 or at outdoor boxes at Sherwood Forest Grocery, Garson Grocery and beside the Tyndall Curling Club. Springfield residents in Anola, Cooks Creek and Birds Hill can pick up The Clipper at numerous locations in Oakbank including the RM office, Garven Grocery and newspaper box locations at the intersections of Garven and PR 207, Pineridge and Hillside Roads and Hwy 15 and PR 207 as well as Lake Trail Convenience in Anola.





Why I Would Support Trudeau In an Election... Again

I sincerely wish Prime Minister Justin Trudeau would graciously step aside and make room for someone else to serve in the prime minister's position and as leader of the Liberal party.

However, if he does not, I will vote for the Liberal party again because the alternatives are not appealing.

I will vote on their record despite its many shortcomings. I will vote for their platform, unless they do a reversal, on the issues I think we Canadians should care about. I will vote for my local current member of Parliament because of his personal and political integrity. I will do so even though I believe Trudeau has made some serious errors in judgment.

I have always believed we should have term appointments for politicians and that no politician should serve more than two terms in office. I do know that not many people will get the opportunity to be prime minister, or even serve in any elected government capacity. I also know that some people serve us so well that we hate to give them up.

However, surely in a country of over 40 million people, there are many more people who are capable of being prime minister or MPs, and some very competent people willing to do so for the right reasons.

Parliaments and prime ministers have demands which seem endless and impossible to satisfy. Indeed, because they often are called upon to appease diametrically opposed interests, they may find themselves in no-win territory. In my view, this Liberal government has served us well in some particularly sensitive and contentious areas, all of which many people might deem disappointments or, worse, broken promises.

Knowing full well that I will miss matters of importance and this list is by no means exhaustive. I nevertheless can think of significant gains in a number of critical areas.

There are seemingly small victories, like diversity and gender equity in cabinet, and support for the rights of LGBTTQ+ people, very meaningful for those directly affected. There are strong beginnings on clean water for First Nations communities.

While much more needs to be done on

health care, housing and school construction, much progress has been made in the funding of First Nations education.

These are opening salvos, not nearly what is needed or hoped for, on other justice issues like universal dental care and access to pharmacare. And, whether we like the carbon tax or not, at least it acknowledges an environmental and climate crisis. These are all matters which matter to me, and hopefully to more Canadians than not, and I hope they will remain parts of the Liberal platform.

Contrast that with the platform of the official opposition, the Conservatives whose whole premise is that Canada is "broken." To remedy that they would defund the CBC, eliminate the Bank of Canada, not attend the G7, and "axe the (carbon) tax," among other measures which have not worked in the past.

These efforts amount to control of the media, politicizing the central bank, negating globalism and denying global warming. They have made no credible commitment to Indigenous reconciliation and have, without evidence, adopted the American strategy of blaming

immigrants for housing shortages, crime and raising the cost of living.

I am always wary of those whose whole strategy is tearing down and making false claims instead of operating from evidence, compassion and truth. I wish it were not so; I really do wish I had the luxury of considering, possibly supporting, an honourable alternative considering what's at stake, but this platform offers no potential for betterment.

On the foreign affairs front, I also believe that Trudeau has helped Canada punch way beyond its size at international tables. I must also admit, I was glad to see him stand up to India and China when domestic interference, murder and human rights were on the line and to do so in the face of criticism from the opposition that his actions jeopardized economic relationships.

To be fair, he has exercised poor judgment regarding some of his political friendships - the

torpedoed contract with WE and the acceptance of a gift from the Aga Khan are examples.

Finally, unless things change significantly, I will cast my vote for my current Liberal MP who has skilfully navigated the above contentious issues with understanding, integrity, even-handedness and grace. If I am to be represented for what I believe is important to Canada, I can think of no one better. I believe I can do so with eyes wide open and without shame knowing what I know about our political system and its frailties and impossibilities.

Given that our politicians are just fallible humans like the rest of us, I choose to vote for someone who, in spite of his shortcomings and hubris, does not spout negativity, foolishness and animosity when given a public forum.

WRAC Artist of the Month

For this month, Winnipeg River Arts Council features the Lac du Bonnet Regional Library.

Located in the Town of Lac du Bonnet, it has for years provided a much loved gathering place, and like many local facilities, it has an interesting history.

As the community grew and developed, residents knew they wanted a library. Starting in 1956, Helen P. Smith ran a lending library out of her basement for 15 years. When the Smiths moved to Winnipeg, due to Helen's failing health, the library moved into Hallie Lavoie's residence.

Due to lack of interest, this home-based lending service was eventually abandoned, and the collection ended up in the back room of The Bay Store's dry goods section. When the store expanded and needed more space, the books were on the move again.

In 1978, renewed interest led to a library committee being formed. Members consisted of Roz Burt, Nick Ostash, Teri Usackis, Art Van Steelant, Joyce Hanton, Eleanor Lewko, Phyllis Robin, Connie Safronetz and Aline Preston. While this group worked towards getting a regional library established, volunteers ran the library in the Lac du Bonnet Senior School.

On April 1, 1981, the Lac du Bonnet Regional Library opened its doors in Suite 1, a small apartment on 70 Park Ave., with a view of the nearby beach. As time passed, the library expanded and also occupied an

adjoining suite.

In October 1989, the board decided to build a custom facility and formed a building committee to oversee the plans. After many fundraisers and grant applications, the committee raised enough funds to cover the building costs.

On Jan. 26, 1991, 78 library volunteers packed up the collection on Park Avenue and moved the books, via bucket brigade, to current location at 84 Third Street.

The library has seven part-time employees: Head librarian Jennifer Hudson Stewart, public services coordinator Laurie Campbell, clerk Crystal Larocque, programming clerk Tannis Smith, assistant clerks Ainsley Van Linden and River Lansard, custodian Donna Kovari. Also, many volunteers assist with maintenance, gardening, programming and other activities.

"From fall to spring, we host after school children's activities, including Lego and Craft Club," Hudson Stewart said. "For adults, we offer Silent Book Club (fourth Thursday of the month), Knitters and Crocheters (Tuesdays 1-3 p.m.) and Lego for Grown-Ups (Tuesdays 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.) Other recent events included Spooky Library, during Halloween Festival, Oct. 26 and Bingo for Books (all ages) on Nov. 21 from 6-7 p.m."

The library is funded by provincial and municipal governments as well as by fundraising. Its board is composed of six members, three from the town (including a

member of council) and three from the RM (including a member of council).

"The library works to provide information and resources for the local population, and offer a welcoming, inclusive place for patrons to find resources and community. It serves the Town and Rural Municipality of Lac du Bonnet, along with surrounding areas. Membership is free to taxpayers in the Town and RM. Non-resident and short term memberships for summer and temporary residents are also available."

Sunrise seeks public feedback for budget

The Sunrise School Division will be getting a jump on the 2025-26 budget process by hosting a public input session prior to the Christmas break.

The school division is asking all interested parties to attend their board of trustees meeting on Dec. 3 at 7 p.m. in the Sunrise Education Centre's mulitpurpose room located at 344 Second Street North in Beausejour.

Participants will be able to provide feedback regarding the public's priorities and where taxpayers would like the division to spend money as it relates to student education and budget initiatives.

The meeting typically includes a budget presentation and provides opportunity for questions from the public. Stakeholder input will help guide the board's decisions and actions.

Those wishing to make a presentation are advised to email jody.thiessen@ sunrisesd.ca by noon on Nov. 29. Those unable to attend the meeting but would like to provide input, please send an email to budget@ sunrisesd.ca

Sunrise will hold a draft budget meeting on the 2025-26 budget next February with the passed budget forwarded to the province for approval by the end of March.

This past March, Sunrise approved the operating expenditures for the 2024-25 school year in the amount of \$82.8 million – an increase of \$7.3 million – with the mill rate climbing from 11.52 mills to 12.32, or 6.9 per cent.

The area of increases and their portion related to the increase to the budget was salaries, bus purchases, inflationary increases and additions to the budget.





Birds Of A Feather

I have mentioned in a previous column that there are over 20 distinct types of sparrows that have been seen in Manitoba. Many of these can be seen in the Eastman region.

A few of the sparrows are so unique looking that you would never know they are part of the sparrow family. The eastern towhee is one of these. A strikingly beautiful bird, the males have dark black heads and backs, black and white tails, white underparts, and cinnamon-coloured sides. The females have the same colouring on the sides but are mostly brown on their

heads, backs, and tail. Both sexes have piercing red eyes.

Large for a sparrow, they are about the size of a robin, growing to a length of up to eight inches or so. Despite this size, they are very difficult birds to spot. Their preferred habitat is dense brush and thickets, and they often forage for food in the long grass of forest edges.

Towhees have quite a varied diet including seeds, insects, tree buds, grasses and weeds, and fruit and even acorns, berries and crops like corn, oats and wheat. If you have ever seen a sparrow forage for food, many of them can be seen planting their feet in leaves or dirt and hopping backwards to dig. This is one area where towhees do resemble other sparrows as they also use this method to find food.

These birds typically nest right on the ground or in tangles up to about four feet off the ground. Perhaps because of this they are sometimes the victims of the brown-headed cowbird

which is known to lay their eggs in the nest of other birds to have those birds hatch and raise their young. They even go so far as to remove the towhee eggs before laying their own and the towhees do not even seem to notice. Hardly the parents of the year! Either species! However, male towhees do vigorously defend their territories in an effort to be able to provide food for the young even if they are not their young.

In the western parts of Canada, there is a slightly different version of this bird called the spotted towhee. I was lucky enough to see that bird on a visit to Vancouver Island in 2022.

As always, my source for details on all birds is Cornell University's All About Birds site.

Hockey Manitoba asked to review fan violence

toba Chiefs (AMC) and the leadership of Sagkeeng Anicinabe Nation are calling for Hockey Manitoba to investigate a violent and racially charged incident at a U18 hockey game where a 15-year-old Sagkeeng boy was injured in the melee.

The incident occurred during a hockey game on Nov. 8 between the Sagkeeng Hawks and the La Broquerie Habs at the Sagkeeng Arena Multiplex. It is alleged that several intoxicated supporters of the visiting team disrupted the game by shouting profanities, which later escalated to a fight in the lobby area where racist slurs

were said to the Sagkeeng community's parents and spectators.

"The safety and wellbeing of our players, staff and the broader community are our highest priorities, stated Sagkeeng Chief E.J. Fontaine.

Acting Grand Chief Betsy Kennedy said youth sports are meant to foster development, respect and enjoyment. Yet, the actions displayed by some parents and spectators supporting the opposing team contravened both the Habs' own 2019 Code of Conduct and basic principles of human decency, respect and reconciliation.

resorting to violence and racism is unacceptable and has no place in any community," Kennedy stated.

In addition to the racial slurs, Sagkeeng Anicinabe Nation maintains a strict no alcohol policy within its borders – a policy ignored by supporters of the La Broquerie team.

"It is essential that anyone visiting any First Nation in Manitoba honour that First Nations' rules and bylaws. To disregard the laws of this Nation demonstrates a profound lack of respect for the health, safety, and dignity of Sagkeeng Anicinabe citizens,' continued Kennedy.

Moving forward, the AMC and Fontaine expect Hockey Manitoba to cooperate in establishing a respectful visitation and conduct agreement for all teams visiting First Nations communities.

"Implementing such a policy would be a significant step forward on the path of reconciliation,' said Fontaine, "It would hold visitors accountable to the rules of the Nation and provide disciplinary action should those rules be broken, as was experienced earlier this month.'

The AMC and Sagkeeng Anicinabe Nation remain committed to fostering safe, welcoming environments for youth sports where players, families, and communities come together in the spirit of respect and positive competition. The AMC expects that all future interactions across youth recreational sports on any First Nation territory contribute to building understanding, mutual respect, and shared enjoyment for the love of the game.
