RM, Town sign joint rec agreement Lac du Bonnet councils pooling resources to develop former Laker's Ski Club site

The Town and RM of Lac du Bonnet are pooling their resources to create new recreational opportunities at the Laker's Ski Club property.

RM council passed a resolution on Nov. 19 accepting the joint recreation facility agreement with the objective of breathing new life into the former Laker's site, located at 30 PR 502.

"I think that this is definitely, from a recreational hub standpoint, going to be an exciting venture," said Reeve Loren Schinkel. "I think the possibilities here are endless.'

The municipalities are collaborating to transform the Laker's site into a community recreation hub. This past spring, the RM had expressed its desire to remediate the property in coordination with the town under a shared vision for a four-season hub to benefit residents in the future.

The Laker's Ski Club ran from 1948 to 2006 when the property was turned over to the town under the condition that the site was reserved exclusively for recreational use. The club's

assets were sold off by the town the following year.

Although technically owned by the town, the property is located in the RM. The site is currently being used by the Fire and Water Music Festival on the August long weekend.

In recent years, the building had fallen into disrepair with no maintenance or upkeep done by either municipality.

The initial phase of the joint council vision has already started to become a reality with the demolition of the former Laker's Ski Club building and site preparation for new structures. The boathouse still resides on the property.

The agreement defines the roles, responsibilities and financial contributions of each municipality for the operation, development and management of the shared recreation facility.

As well, the purchase of a new dock for the property has been approved at a cost of \$15,000 with RM funds being drawn from the recreation reserve and the expense being shared with the town covering half as per the agreement's 50-50 cost-sharing clause, which

includes insurance.

The agreement also stipulates that space within the property may be rented or leased to outside organizations, businesses or entrepreneurs for purposes consistent with the goals of the facility, with any revenues shared accordingly.

Any proposed developments, activities or improvements pertaining to the property will be presented at a joint meeting so projects can be reviewed and considered by both councils prior

The agreement became valid as of Nov. 20 for a three-year term. It will automatically be renewed for successive fiveyear terms unless either party provides written notice of intent to either terminate or modify the

Additionally, the agreement outlines an inventory of buildings as well as 189 pieces of equipment including skates and skis.

Offering his own thoughts, Deputy Reeve Greg Mandzuk said he's long been a supporter of fostering opportunities in recreation, which he described as, "one of the true pillars that RMs and towns and municipalities in general have been built on for years.'

He also acknowledged that delivering recreational opportunities in a large municipality like the RM is an ongoing effort.

"For those people that question, 'Why this area, or why that area?' Well, with an RM this big, I think having different areas with recreational opportunities, this being one exciting one that we're jointly going forward with the town, represents a huge move forward in terms of recreation."

Sunrise shifting approach to literacy

Sunrise School Division hosted Dr. Valdine Bjornson at École Dugald School as part of the Nov. 22 divisional professional development day for early years teachers.

Dr. Bjornson is a certified reading clinician, the founder of the Reading and Learning Clinic of Manitoba and the Education Director for Teachers for Reading Canada. She is committed to providing Canadian educators with evidence-based professional development and advocating for students with dyslexia, dysgraphia, and dyscalculia. Additionally, she is an accredited Structured Literacy/Dyslexia Specialist through the International Dyslexia Association.

Dr. Bjornson reinforced



that students require explicit, systematic phonics-based instruction. She explained that the brain must map words to enable recall, which involves students being able to pronounce words, write the corresponding sounds as letters, understand the meaning of the word and its components, and recognize the origins of the word or its parts. Additionally, she

highlighted the importance of the timing of reading instruction because the gap between skilled and struggling readers tends to widen over time, underscoring the need for early and effective literacy instruction.

Sunrise School Division has already begun shifting approaches to teaching literacy. This includes teaching phonological awareness (the ability to recognize and manipulate the sounds of spoken words) and phonics in a manner that is explicit and systematic within the early years. This approach is based on the latest scientific research, is proven to be effective and is supported by the recent position statements from the Manitoba Pediatrician So-

ciety, Canadian Pediatric Society and the Manitoba Association of School Psychologists.

Some changes in classrooms include sound walls instead of word walls, decodable books instead of levelled books and a concentration on word study instead of traditional spelling tests.

RCMP body-worn cameras deployed North Eastman detachments to begin using recording devices this coming spring

While some RCMP officers in Manitoba have started using body-worn cameras to remove police and public bias, it is believed North Eastman detachments will not have access to them until this coming spring.

The Manitoba RCMP has begun their portion of the national rollout of body-worn cameras. Officers will usually wear their Axon Public Safety Canada Inc. cameras on their chest and the public will know it's recording when a red light is visible and flashing below the lens of the camera. The cameras will be on during service calls and investigations as well as responses to protests and mental health calls. The devices will not be engaged in situations where there is an expectation of privacy including strip searches or in washrooms, hospitals and treatment centres.

RCMP Sgt. Paul Manaigre said police believe the body-worn cameras will help increase trust between police and the communities they serve because the video evidence collected will provide an independent and objective way to capture interactions between all parties involved. It will also help resolve public complaints more quickly and improve evidence gathering.

A 28-year member of the RCMP, Manaigre said the majority of that time he has been working at detachments and responding to calls from the public for assistance. Over the course of his career he has had interactions with thousands of individuals in almost every policing scenario imaginable. Thankfully, the vast majority of those interactions are peaceful and often even positive, and do not

result in any kind of concern from the member of the public who is involved or from the RCMP.

He said there are, however, times when the interaction is difficult, a scene is chaotic and where the situation evolves to a point where there is potential for danger.

"When we arrive at a scene, we know it may be on the person's worst day of their lives, and emotions may be running high for the responding officers, they are going into an unknown situation, and there may be a high level of risk associated to the call," Manaigre said. "There are so many things happening at once, and interactions at the scene can be remembered differently by both the officer and the member of the public."

He said if there is a discrepancy as to what occurred during the call, the video can now be reviewed, which benefits the public and the police. The use of these cameras will be complemented by a digital evidence management system that will be used to store and manage body-worn video.

"This video review takes away police and public bias as to what happened and what was said. The fact that statements are recorded and that the cameras will be recording when evidence is

located at the scene will no doubt also be very beneficial to investigations.'

In southern Manitoba, Steinbach was the first to begin using cameras as of Nov. 22 with detachments in Portage la Prairie, Amaranth and Treherne kicked off Dec. 4. East St. Paul, Grand Marais and Selkirk begin Jan. 7 with St-Pierre-Jolys starting Jan. 22.

Manaigre said Beausejour and Oakbank detachments are scheduled for March 2025, but he was unable to provide information on the Powerview and Lac du Bonnet detachments as he believes "those are needing infrastructure upgrades prior to the rollout.

By April 2025, it is expected that over 490 Manitoba RCMP officers in 44 detachments will be equipped with body-worn cameras. This will include detachments providing policing services to Ebb and Flow, Peguis, Sioux Valley and a number of other First Nation communities.

All other detachments throughout Manitoba will have body-worn cameras and the digital evidence management system rolled out to them in a phased approach over the course of the next 18 months. An estimated 700 cameras are expected to be used by Manitoba RCMP officers.

"Communities have been asking for more accountability and transparency in policing," said Assistant Commissioner Scott McMurchy, Commanding Officer, Manitoba RCMP. "(The) launch... truly demonstrates our commitment to enhancing the trust between the Manitoba RCMP and the communities we so proudly serve throughout the province."

The CAFC handles complaints about false, deceptive, misleading, or fraudulent acts, including telemarketing, mail fraud, ID theft, internet fraud, and other consumer scams with a Canadian connection. It plays a role in the collection and dissemination of information to the appropriate enforcement agency. The CAFC educates the public about specific scams and distributes educational and prevention resource materials. Coordinated by the Ontario Provincial Police,

the RCMP, and the Competition Bureau of Canada, its services are offered in both official languages. Hours are 9 a.m. to 3:45 p.m., Monday to Friday.

Phone: 1-888-495-8501 Emergency scams prey on your fear of a loved one being hurt or in trouble. Scammers claim to be someone you know and tell you they need money immediately.

Scenarios they may use include:

- Needing bail money because they've been arrested:
- · Being in a car accident or
- Trouble returning from a foreign country.

Reports are showing a new variation where fraudsters contact you via email or text message, claiming to be a loved one asking for a favour. For this favour, they'll ask you to send money or gift cards.

Fraudsters will:

- Claim to be law enforcement officials, or lawyers or impersonate the grandchild/family member;
- Use urgency and threats to convince you to take out money;
- Claim that there is a 'gag order" preventing you from speaking about the situation; or
- If you agree to pay the requested amount (cash or cryptocurrency), fraudsters will arrange to pick up the funds in person or will ask you to send cash in the mail.

Broken Phone Scam

The CAFC is getting reports about a fraudulent emergency text or social media messages. The fraudster might claim to be a family member or loved one, saying that their cell phone is broken or has been dropped in water. The fraudster will then provide an alternate phone number to contact them at. They will proceed to ask for a favour by requesting funds from the victim to repair the broken phone or to pay

using the broken phone variation (for example, in English only).

Grandparent Scams

A senior gets a phone call, typically on their home phone/landline, from a caller claiming to be their grandchild or calling on behalf of their grandchild. They say they need money as soon as possible, whether to pay bail, lawyer's fees, hospital fees, or ambulance fees. They will say the payment is needed immediately to avoid going to jail or to be released from jail.

Note: These types of scams can target anyone, not just seniors or grandparents.

How to protect yourself

- If you receive a phone call claiming to be from a family member in an emergency, hang up the phone and contact them directly using a phone number you already have - not one provided by the suspected fraudster
- If the caller claims to be a law enforcement official, hang up and call your local police directly using a phone number from a reputable source – not one provided by the suspected fraudster.
- Be suspicious of telephone calls that require you to act immediately and request money for a family member in distress.
- Listen to that inner voice that is screaming at you, "This doesn't sound right.'
- It is important to know the Canadian criminal justice system does not allow for someone to be bailed out of jail with cash or cryptocurrency.
- Be careful what you post online.
- Scammers can get details that you share on social media platforms and dating sites to target you or get names and details about your loved ones.
- Don't trust caller ID names and numbers.
- Scammers use technology to disguise the actual number they are calling from and can make it appear as a trusted phone number, also known as spoofing.

taking part in the annual Christmas on Park event in Beausejour on Nov. 22. It was a great way to ring in the holiday season and I thank all the businesses that participated, as well as the organizers and volunteers who continue to make this community celebration a tremendous success every year. Fortunately, the snow arrived in time.

Another annual event at this time of year is the Manitoba Government's Speech from the Throne, though the speech on Nov. 19 hasn't been a cause for celebration. The NDP's preview of its legislative plans for the year ahead showed no vision for addressing Manitoba's

rising crime, increasing health care wait-times. and overcrowded schools. The speech was a shortsighted failure in matters of affordability and our province's economic health. Premier Wab Kinew and his government are offering empty rhetoric on affordability with no effort to lower grocery prices, reduce taxes, grow the economy or improve trade, other than depending on initiatives and investments by the previous Progressive Conservative government.

The PC's left this NDP government with over \$1/4 billion surplus in 2023. They also received a historic \$842 million windfall from the federal government in transfer payments. Federal transfers are going up this year with Manitoba receiving \$4.3 billion in equalization that began in April. That is a 24 per cent increase from last year. Yet after only one year since forming government, Kinew's NDP has taken Manitoba

into a \$2 billion deficit.

The Premier's recent announcement of increased funding for municipalities appears nothing more than a financial shell game. In reality, the NDP has cut \$16.9 million in annual funding from municipalities, including \$12.5 from the Building Sustainable Communities program and \$4.4 million from Green Team. That means the Premier's promise of a \$16.8 million guaranteed increase for municipalities actually nets out to less than zero, and that doesn't even take into account his cuts to the Arts, Culture and Sport in Community grants, which was \$100 million. So, while the Premier is getting a 24 per cent increase in equalization from the Federal Government, he is giving municipalities less than zero in new funding this year. I think Manitoba municipalities deserve better and I think the Premier can do better, by sharing

An upcoming hydro

in the Throne Speech is another NDP recycled promise, and without any proposal to pay for it. This coming from a government that has just given itself the power to raise hydro rates at the cabinet table and raised hydro rates across the board by one per cent last spring. A rate freeze today would bring rate shock and surging prices tomorrow and the independent Public Utility Board was created to assess hydro rates based on facts, not political pandering.

It's the same lack of accountability from the Kinew government on other taxes. They hit homeowners with a \$148 million education property tax hike while cancelling plans for nine new schools that included over 770 daycare spaces. Don't forget, the NDP will also be ending the education property tax phase-out while allowing 17 per cent school tax increases on homeowners and seniors. Manitobans really are paying more and getting less from this government.

Meanwhile, residents of Lac du Bonnet are awaiting construction of their town's planned personal care home, and for the government to keep to the project's time line. We are hoping to see shovels in the ground on the \$66.4 million care home before the New Year, but the NDP have been slow to keep their promises on this project.

This is the time of year when communities come together to aide those who struggle to make ends meet. We are fortunate in our region to have many organizations and businesses that make the effort to collect funds, food, clothing and toys for families in need. Whether it be a local charity, hamper or food bank, there are many opportunities to donate if you are able, so that all may share in a happy holiday season. Merry Christmas and all the best in the New Year!



Large Print

We know that many of our members need or prefer to read books in large print formats – generally easier to read. While we do carry large print books in the library, we recognize that our selection is limited. We're excited to share that with funding from the Manitoba Accessibility Fund, we'll be expanding our large print collections at both branches in early 2025. What a great way to begin the New Year.

Air Quality Monitoring

We love being community scientists, so we are happy to once again partner with the Manitoba Lung Association and Health Canada. Last year we received radon detectors to measure radon levels in indoor air - these detectors are still available to borrow from both library branches. This year we received a PurpleAir sensor that measures particulate matter smaller than 2.5 micrometers in diameter (PM2.5) in outdoor air. These tiny airborne particles are emitted by vehicles, industry, forest fires and other sources.

Our air quality sensor transmits data about local PM2.5 concentrations to the real-time PurpleAir map. When viewing the map, you will see colourcoded numbers from one to 10 that indicate the level of immediate health risk associated with local air quality – one indicates low risk and 10 indicates very high risk. Tax Strategies for Year End

In 2024 the markets have been strong – a welcome sight for many investors. However, strong gains can sometimes come with a side effect: higher taxes. Let's explore a few strategies to help you minimize your tax bill.

1. RRSP Meltdown

Efficiently withdrawing funds from your RRSP or RRIF is a common concern. One strategy, often called an RRSP meltdown, involves withdrawing extra from your RRSP now, to avoid a big tax hit down the road. To implement you must estimate your annual income, determine your tax bracket, and withdraw just enough from your RRSP to "fill up" that bracket. Typically, this withdrawal is timed for year-end, when you have a clearer picture of your total income for

By doing so, you maximize your RRSP withdrawals at your current tax rate and can reinvest the extra funds into a TFSA or nonregistered account. This strategy isn't for everyone and should align with your broader financial plan.

2. Non-Registered Account Optimization

The financial world loves its acronyms – RRSPs, RRIFs, TFSAs, LIRAs, PRIFs, and LIFs – all tied to registered accounts. Investments outside of this alphabet soup, such as in non-registered or joint accounts, often come with

yearly tax obligations. Nonregistered accounts follow a 'pay-as-you-go' tax system, requiring you to report realized capital gains, interest, and dividends each year. These accounts are where the tax impact of significant market rallies is most noticeable. Here are two strategies to manage taxes in these accounts:

- · Focus on Capital Gains: Interest income (e.g., from GICs or bonds) is taxed at your regular income rate, while dividends benefit from a tax credit and capital gains are taxed most favourably. Adjusting your non-registered investments to emphasize capital gains can reduce your annual tax bill. However, investments with additional tax perks often have more risk, any changes should align with your overall risk tolerance and investment plan.
- Tax Loss Harvesting: At year-end, consider selling investments that have declined in value to trigger capital losses. These losses can offset capital gains, reducing your taxes. You can carry losses back up to three years or forward indefinitely to optimize your tax situation. We review portfolios every year to see if we can take advantage of this strategy for clients.

3. Pension Income Tax Credit

If you're 65 or older, you may be eligible for the federal non-refundable pension income tax credit on up to \$2,000 of eligible pension income. This 15 per cent credit can reduce your tax bill, but you'll need to ensure your income qualifies.

Eligible sources include workplace pensions or, after age 65, withdrawals from a RRIF. If you haven't claimed this credit yet, it's worth withdrawing \$2,000 from your RRIF to take full advantage.

4. In-Kind Donations

Donating securities inkind is one of the most taxefficient, ways to support

efficient ways to support a charity. This approach offers a twofold benefit:

1. You receive a tax deduction for the full market value of the donation.

2. You avoid paying capital gains tax on the growth of the donated securities.

For example, if you purchased shares for \$10,000 and they are now worth \$15,000, donating the shares provides a \$15,000

donation tax credit without triggering tax on the \$5,000 capital gain. This strategy can significantly reduce your tax burden while maximizing your charitable impact.

Additional Tips:

- Donations exceeding \$200 qualify for a higher combined federal and provincial tax credit of 46.4 per cent.
- You and your spouse can combine donation credits to optimize your overall tax savings.
- Unused donation credits can be carried forward for up to five years, allowing flexibility in your tax planning.




Howden was set to become an unrestricted free agent after this season upon the expiry of his current two-year, \$3.8-million pact. He inked

Red Moon Road, long-time staples of Winnipeg's music scene, showcased their artistry and showmanship in an Eastern Manitoba Concert Association performance full of Christmas cheer on Nov. 29 in Pinawa.
