Fleming recognized on national stage

Lac du Bonnet EMO recipient of Emergency Management Exemplary Service Award

Lac du Bonnet's director of emergency management will be joining a number of his counterparts from across Canada who have been recognized nationally for exemplary service.

John Fleming said he was aware the RM had submitted his name for the Federal-Provincial-Territorial **Emergency Management Exemplary** Service Award some time ago, that had fallen off his radar. That is until earlier this month when he received a phone call from the Public Safety Emergency Preparedness Office in Ottawa informing him he'd soon be receiving an email outlining details for an official ceremony scheduled in the nation's capital on Feb. 26.

"It sort of caught me on the blind side. It's always nice to be nominated," said Fleming. "But I really didn't anticipate it would go as far as it did."

Fleming, a former member of the RCMP, has worked with the Town and RM of Lac du Bonnet since 2012. As climate continues to fluctuate, natural disasters are occurring and spreading across the country. With the increasing frequency of forest fires and floods, the growing risk has encroached evercloser to home, he said, citing efforts to sandbag and even evacuate communities in areas such as Whiteshell Provincial Park.

Sticking one's head in the sand and assuming that "it'll never happen to me" is an ill-advised approach, he said.

"It's not a matter of if, it's a matter of when," he said. "And I think that is what motivates me to continue to provide that community education, community awareness... so people will come to the understanding that it can happen here, and (they) should get prepared."

While Fleming said he does occasionally find himself considering whether the time has come to change gears, headlines keep him convinced he's on the right track.

"Every time you pick up the newspaper and there's some other community or province that's undergoing floods or wildfires, it just renews that urgency, that commitment," he said. "I don't have any plans to make a new plan."

Fleming also expressed gratitude to both munici-

palities for their support of not only the program, but himself.

"It's important for our municipalities and provincial governments to understand the importance of being prepared," he said. "It's very hard some-

times to equate preparedness with the dollars that it costs to be prepared, because you can't really measure preparedness. So, they have placed a great amount of faith in my judgment, and I certainly appreciate that trust."

For those who may question the cost of emergency management programs, Fleming said the cost of inaction is even greater.

"An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," he said. "The investments that we put into mitigation strategies, whether it's flood or wildfire, when you look at what it costs to rebuild hundreds of homes and businesses, mitigation strategies are a pretty cheap cure."

Reeve Loren Schinkel said council did not hesitate to submit Fleming's nomination.

"He's been phenomenal for us," said Schinkel. The reeve praised Fleming in terms of lining up all the proverbial ducks in a row, from making sure

everyone is up to spec with their training and aware of what their roles are, including councils, as well as taking the lead on initiatives like FireSmart. "He makes sure that everybody understands

what their role is, and that's critical, because if there's ever an incident and you don't know what's happening, that's where the rubber meets the road," said Schinkel.

He said Fleming was also involved in coordinating some major incidents including evacuations ahead of a forest and overland fire in the Brightstone area.

"I think that he's one of the best in the province when it comes to the program that we have."

The reeve said the position tends to be undervalued and emphasized the role requires no shortage of dedication and commitment to set the program

But Fleming isn't just proactive, said Schinkel. 'He's very enthusiastic about his job, and it shows," he said. "That's why he's such a good re-



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Holiday Train supports local food banks

mouth Lions Club have made sizeable food bank donations of nonperishable food items and funds collected during the annual Canadian Pacific Kansas City (CPKC) Holiday Train event.

On Dec. 3, the CPKC Holiday Train made a triumphant return to Whitemouth by entertaining an estimated crowd of 1,200 while the Lions collected food items and monetary donations.

The next day, the Lions donated a combined 519 pounds of nonperishable food and a total of \$7,044 to the Lac du Bonnet, Beausejour and Reynolds food

Raising money and awareness about hunger issues in Canada and the U.S. since 1999, each Holiday Train has brightly decorated rail cars, including a modified box car that has been turned into a travelling

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stage for performers. When the stage door opened, Tyler Shaw and Shawnee Kish performed at the Whitemouth stop on Railway Avenue, across from the Whitemouth Hotel.

The concerts are free, but attendees are encouraged to bring either a nonperishable food item or a cash donation.

Of the \$7,044 collected, CPKC donated \$4,000, \$1,400 came from the Lions, \$1,139 was in the collection box plus another \$250 from the RM of Whitemouth. The Whitemouth Hotel donated \$105 while Spicy Radish Restaurant donated \$100. Brincheski farms also donated \$50.

Over the past 20-plus years, the Whitemouth Holiday Train stops have resulted in the collection of over 27,000 pounds of nonperishable food items locally and monetary donations of almost \$87,000 that stay in the region.

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The Manitoba government has introduced legislation that would impose new, stronger licensing consequences on drivers convicted of impaired driving and refusal offences that

cause bodily harm or death. Justice Minister Matt Wiebe, minister responsible for Manitoba Public Insurance said impaired driving poses a serious threat to public safety, as 10 per cent of fatal collisions in Manitoba in 2023 included impaired driving as a contributing factor.

"Our government is committed to taking concrete action to protect our communities and improve road safety by introducing changes which reinforce that there are real and serious consequences for choosing to drink and drive," said Wiebe.

Proposed amendments to the Highway Traffic Act would increase the automatic driver's licence suspension for a second conviction when a driver is convicted of an impaired driving or refusal offence that causes bodily harm or death. Currently, a driver convicted for the first time receives a five-year automatic licence suspension and if a driver is convicted of a second offence within 10 years, they receive an automatic 10-year licence suspension. The amendments would increase that second 10-year suspension to a lifetime suspension.

MADD Canada president Tanya Hansen congratulated the Manitoba government for the steps

being taken to prevent impaired driving.

"Despite the progress that has been made, hundreds of people are killed and thousands more are injured every year in alcohol and drug-related crashes," Hansen said. "It is important that those who cause the most harm are held accountable and given sanctions to prevent them from driving impaired again including lengthy driving bans and zero tolerance."

"The MACP is committed to enforcing the law when it comes to impaired drivers," said Insp. Michael Gagliardi, chair, Manitoba Association of Chiefs of Police traffic safety committee. "We are hopeful that these new amendments will be a useful deterrent for those that choose to get behind the wheel impaired. Each year, we pull over thousands of vehicles, and unfortunately, we do see repeat offenders. Increasing the driver's licence prohibition is sending a very strong message to all Manitobans. We hope for the safety of everyone, that these new amendments save lives."

The amendments would also prohibit a person convicted of these offences from driving with any alcohol in their blood (zero per cent blood alcohol concentration). For a first conviction, the prohibition would last for seven years. For a second conviction within 10 years, it would result in a lifetime prohibition. Drivers who breach their alcohol prohibition would have sanctions imposed that mirror those under the Immediate Roadside Prohibition program, which include roadside suspension, vehicle impoundment and other sanctions that escalate with the number of breaches, such as referral for driver assessment, ignition interlock and financial administrative penalties.



The CAFC handles complaints about false, deceptive, misleading, or fraudulent acts, including telemarketing, mail fraud, ID theft, internet fraud, and other consumer scams with a Canadian connection. It plays a role in the collection and dissemination of information to the appropriate enforcement agency. The CAFC educates the public about specific scams and distributes educational and prevention resource materials. Coordinated by the Ontario Provincial Police, the RCMP, and the Competition Bureau of Canada, its services are offered in both official languages. Hours are 9 a.m. to 3:45 p.m., Monday to Friday.

www.antifraud centre.ca Phone: 1-888-495-8501 Emergency scams prey on your fear of a loved one being hurt or in trouble. Scammers claim to be someone you know and tell you they need money immediately.

Scenarios they may use include:

- Needing bail money because they've been arrested;
- · Being in a car accident or
- · Trouble returning from a foreign country.

Reports are showing a new variation where fraudsters contact you via email or text message, claiming to be a loved one asking for a favour. For this favour, they'll ask you to send money or gift cards.

Fraudsters will:

- · Claim to be law enforcement officials, or lawyers or impersonate the grandchild/family member;
- · Use urgency and threats to convince you to take out money;
- Claim that there is a gag order" preventing you from speaking about the situation; or
 - If you agree to pay the

requested amount (cash or cryptocurrency), fraudsters will arrange to pick up the funds in person or will ask you to send cash in the mail.

Broken Phone Scam

The CAFC is getting reports about a fraudulent emergency text or social media messages. The fraudster might claim to be a family member or loved one, saying that their cell phone is broken or has been dropped in water. The fraudster will then provide an alternate phone number to contact them at. They will proceed to ask for a favour by requesting funds from the victim to repair the broken phone or to pay a bill.

Grandparent Scams

A senior gets a phone call, typically on their home phone/landline, from a caller claiming to be their grandchild or calling on behalf of their grandchild. They say they need money as soon as possible, whether to pay bail, lawyer's fees, hospital fees, or ambulance fees. They will say the payment is needed immediately to avoid going to jail or to be released from jail.

Note: These types of scams can target anyone, not just seniors or grandparents.

How to protect yourself

- If you receive a phone call claiming to be from a family member in an emergency, hang up the phone and contact them directly using a phone number you already have - not one provided by the suspected fraudster.
- If the caller claims to be a law enforcement official, hang up and call your local police directly using a phone number from a reputable source – not one provided by the suspected fraudster.
- Be suspicious of telephone calls that require you to act immediately and request money for a family member in distress.
- Listen to that inner voice that is screaming at you, "This doesn't sound right."
- It is important to know the Canadian criminal justice system does not allow for someone to be bailed out of jail with cash or cryptocurrency.
- Be careful what you post online.
- Scammers can get details that you share on social media platforms and dating sites to target you or get names and details about your loved ones.
- Don't trust caller ID names and numbers.
- Scammers use technology to disguise the actual number they are calling from and can make it appear as a trusted phone number, also known as spoofing.

Well Done


Dear Editor;

Members of the Canadian Union of Postal Workers went on strike on Nov. 15 due to unresolved issues with Canada Post.

That's an interesting statement as just about everybody has unresolved issues with Canada Post: from customers to management to the striking members of CUPW.

Canada Post has a problem with itself, not the least of which is the fact it loses half a billion dollars a year and it doesn't seem to have any idea how to fix it.

Personally, I don't think that Canada Post workers should have the right to strike, because they have a monopoly on first class mail, and in many parts of the country, they are the only way of getting letters and parcels delivered. They are an essential service and essential services should not be able to go on strike.

When Canada Post goes on strike they hold the citizens and businesses of Canada hostage.

Businesses have moved away from Canada Post with e-Transfers of funds to pay bills. In addition,

over the phone or email credit card payments have replaced a lot of cheque in the mail traffic.

That said, many people and businesses still depend heavily on Canada Post so I re-state, Canada Post workers should not be allowed to go on strike.

Before readers get too upset about that idea, let's consider some facts. In addition to being an essential service, Canada Post workers have it pretty good. They have reasonable salaries, those that work indoors have a pretty good environment to work in. The postal carriers get paid to work in outdoor conditions and yes, sometimes the weather is a bit of an issue. However the carriers get paid to get fresh air, exercise and good cardio activity. Some work early hours but they also get off early. They have health benefits, various benefits and pensions.

I have even less sympathy for the Canada Post management, all 13 of the highly overpaid vicepresidents and hundreds of management staff. The management team hasn't figured out how to make a profit with a business that has a nation-wide presence and a monopoly on first class mail.

The corporation stubbornly refuses to provide nation-wide services when they have actual staff and facilities in every city, town and village across the nation.

They refuse to provide any kind of banking services. You can apply for a passport, but no other federal services. They wouldn't even allow post offices to have fax machines 30 years ago, but they insisted on having staff send in reports by fax.

They don't have community access computers, they don't offer quick print or any of a myriad of services. Truth be known, many of their small post office staff have a very short and sometimes pretty lonely day as the amount of mail that is being handled.

Then there's the service. At the local level where the staff are not under CUPW, it's really good. In the larger towns where the staff are under CUPW rules, they tend to be bound to work by the rules and those rules aren't always customer friendly.

I have written many times about our trials and tribulations of trying to be supportive of local post offices. It's a losing battle, but not because of the local staff. If we deliver papers directly to a post office that isn't ruled by CUPW, the papers are put in the boxes within hours or even minutes. If it's a CUPW governed office, sometimes the rule checkers get trigger happy and papers can wait for up to four business days to be put in the boxes. That obviously doesn't work for a weekly paper. That means if the papers don't get boxed by Friday, they

can sit until next Tuesday. Also, if we wanted to get the quick and willing service that local postmasters give us, we had to drive the papers to each town. Why is that? It's because if we drop the papers off at one post office, it can take up to seven days to get through the warehouse in Winnipeg and back out to the local post offices. Not always, but often, paper deliveries within Manitoba take up to a week. Out of

up to three.

CUPW almost always goes on strike near Christmas in order to commit maximum damage on Canada Post and the customers. Small businesses depend on the mail for bills to be paid. Two weeks with no income creates huge cash flow problems and, quite frankly, I resent that very much.

Canada Post passes a half billion dollar financial loss burden onto Canadian tax payers every year and we all pay for it plus the expenses of a restricted cash flow during a strike. I say, sell Canada Post! Between private interests, emails, e-Transfers and couriers, we might do just fine and with a lot less aggravation.

Selling Canada Post won't likely happen but something needs to happen to give better service to citizens and businesses.



Coun. Scott Phillips as one of two VPs elected by 700-plus delegates at the 26th annual fall convention of the AMM at the end of November.

Saluk and Phillips faced off against RM of Wallace-Woodworth Reeve Clayton Canart and Stonewall Mayor Sandra Smith for the VP positions. Saluk received the highest tally at 349 votes with Phillips registering 335. Canart received 156 votes with Smith netting 132.

Thompson Coun. Kathy Valentino was re-elected as president beating out Ian Drul from the RM of Harrison Park. The trio will serve a two-year term.

Valentino said she is incredibly excited to get to work Saluk and Phillips, with a focus on connecting with all AMM members to strengthen local communities and grow our province."

"Brad and Scott are extremely passionate municipal leaders," said Valentino. "Our executive team is committed to serving with professionalism, determination and a shared goal of amplifying municipal voices and advancing the interests of all municipalities."

The AMM represents all of Manitoba's 137 incorporated municipalities with a view on what the future holds for municipal governments and the challenges that face them. The association provides the support and leadership needed to promote strong, functional councils that represent the order of government closest to the people

AMM executive members meet one or two times per month, including those with government ministers at the Manitoba Legislature throughout the year.

Saluk is no stranger to serving with the AMM. He was first elected Eastern director in 2015 and held that position until being elected as a VP in 2018, 2020 and 2022.

In addition to being a three-term Reeve of the RM of Brokenhead, he had been on Beausejour town council for 10 years.

"Working with Kathy the last couple of years, we really went after this one to maintain continuity with the executive," Saluk said. "We've worked closely with the new minister over the last year and we have been able to build up a lot of momentum lately and we didn't want that to stop."

Saluk said one of AMM's key issues is the need for increased provincial funding for municipalities following a multi-year freeze.

Saluk said the province last week announced an increase of \$42 million in funding for municipalities outside Winnipeg, but when you break that down over the amount of municipali-

ties in Manitoba it "doesn't account to much."

"Giving us a two per cent increase over six years is not sufficient," he said.


He also believes a new funding formula is required.

"They do it per capita, which is not good enough in this day and age as many municipalities with small populations have some of the largest geographies to take care of, and that's not

good," Saluk said. "Our goal is to find an escalator model for all 137 municipalities. Right now, what they are doing only works for the larger centres."

The North Eastman region is also well represented at the board level. Beausejour Mayor Ray Schirle and RM of Lac du Bonnet Reeve Loren Schinkel are eastern district directors.





CLIPPER D CPTC season opener Dec. 14-15

The Canadian Power Toboggan Championships (CPTC) will be getting the 2024-25 snowmobile race season started this weekend at the Co-op Community Complex in Beausejour.

The CPTC host the first race event of the year Dec. 14 and 15. Racers of all ages and skill levels from across North America compete in Stock, Modified, Vintage and Motorcycle classes, from Kitty Kat right through to the newest and fastest Pro Champ 440 class – the featured Canadian Championship race reaching speeds of 170 km/h.

More than 30 drivers had registered as of Dec. 4. CPTC president Jared Black said many of the big name drivers including Gunnar Sterne, Blaine Stephenson, Sabrina Blanchet, Matt Goede, Justin Peterson and Travis MacDonald are expected to be in Beausejour.

"Last year we cleared over 100 racers on both days so it's safe to say we should get that many again," Black said. "The fact we have 30 already is pretty impressive.

The Greatest Show on Snow since 1963, the Canadian Power Toboggan Championships is the longest-running snowmobile race in the world. CPTC is a commu-

nity-based non-profit organization which has over 200 volunteers who worked tirelessly.

Although Manitoba had unseasonably warm temperatures in November, Black said there are no concerns about track conditions.

When the temperatures dropped, they dropped hard, and with that rain we had it really set the frost in the ground," Black said. "The trucks have been flooding around the clock since last Wednesday so we have around five inches of ice now and we plan to have eight inches by race weekend."

Racing begins at 1 p.m. Saturday. A social will immediately follow the daily race events and continue until midnight in the Moose Den.

On Sunday, racing is at 11 a.m. and continuing on throughout

Thomas. That trio fashioned the second Comets goal at 12:57 of the second, but this time Thomas scored.


